



What you need to know to vote in the November 3, 2020 General Election...

HOW CAN I VOTE BY MAIL?



All active registered voters in New Jersey will automatically receive their ballots in the mail. Then it's as easy as **VOTE, SIGN, SEAL, RETURN**. How you return it is up to you.

- 1... Mail:** It must be postmarked on or before 8:00 p.m. November 3 and be received by your county's Board of Elections on or before November 10.
- 2... Secure Ballot Drop Box:** Place your ballot in one of your county's secure ballot drop boxes by 8:00 p.m. on November 3.
- 3... Board of Elections Office:** Deliver your ballot in person to your county's Board of Elections Office by 8:00 p.m. on November 3.
- 4... Polling Place:** Bring your ballot to your polling place by 8:00 p.m. on election day, November 3. Remember only you, the voter, can bring your ballot to your polling place on election day.

WHAT IF I HAVEN'T RECEIVED MY BALLOT?



Every active voter registered in New Jersey should receive a ballot in the mail. If it hasn't arrived by October 12, track your vote-by-mail ballot status online at **Vote.NJ.Gov** or contact your County Clerk, listed on the County Election Officials page.

CAN I VOTE IN PERSON?



You may choose to vote in person at your polling place, from 6:00 a.m. to 8:00 p.m. on election day, November 3, and you will be provided a **provisional paper ballot**. Accommodations will be made for people with disabilities to use an accessible voting device. Remember, you can return your vote-by-mail ballot at your polling place. Go to **Vote.NJ.Gov** for your polling place, listed on the Find Your Polling Location page.

HOW DO I REGISTER TO VOTE?

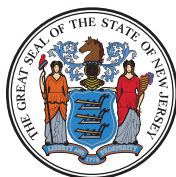


You must be registered by October 13 in order to vote. Visit **Vote.NJ.Gov** for online voter registration or to check your registration status.

WOODLAND PARK VOTERS

What you need to know about voting in the 2020 election

There is no need to request a mail-in ballot in New Jersey.

County Clerks are mailing ballots to every active registered voter.

There is also no need to add postage to your ballot, as paid return postage is provided to all voters.

Here is everything you need to know about voting by mail, in person, early or absentee.

- **When will I receive my ballot?** Clerks have begun mailing ballots and they will all be mailed by Oct. 5. If you do not receive your ballot, contact your Clerk directly. You can find their contact information here.



- **What do I do once I receive my ballot and cast my vote?** Return your ballot immediately by: putting it in a USPS mailbox, delivering it to any secure drop box in the County (the drop box in Woodland Park will be located outside at the municipal complex on Brophy Lane between the Municipal Building doors and the Police Dept. doors, with 24-hour access and security cameras), delivering it to the County Board of Elections, or delivering it to one of two polling locations in Woodland Park on Election Day.

(You can drop off your ballot in Passaic County only. If you do not, your ballot will not be counted. Should you need to use a drop box near Woodland Park, make sure you're using one in your home county.)

- **Will I be able to vote in person?** At least one polling location per municipality must be open to voters who wish to vote in person (Woodland Park will have one at the Boys & Girls Club, 8 Memorial Dr. and one at Charles Olbon School, 50 Lincoln Ln.). However, votes at a polling location will be cast provisionally to prevent voters from voting twice. While machine voting is only available to those who are not physically able to cast a provisional ballot.

- **How do I know my vote will be counted?** There is an equal amount of Republican and Democrat representatives on the Board of Elections who process and count ballots. You can call the Passaic County Board of Elections to make sure your ballot has been received or track your ballot online to make sure it arrives on time, by clicking [here](#).

- **Is there a difference between a Vote by Mail ballot and an Absentee Ballot? NO.** In New Jersey, all ballots for the General Election are the same.
